

Does this imply that we have a responsibility to warn others of spiritual danger?
- 4. **Regret:** There may be a sense of regret for not having taken the opportunity to share the hope and love found in Jesus Christ with someone who needed to hear it.

Why should we evangelize if the elect will be saved anyway?

> This question touches on deep theological concepts regarding election, free will, and the responsibility of Christians to evangelize. And how can they hear without someone preaching to them? And how can anyone preach unless they are sent? As it is written: "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!"

Romans 10:13-15

In the end, salvation is from the Lord: Ultimately, salvation relies on God's sovereign mercy and grace. Jesus informed Nicodemus that without being born again, one cannot perceive or enter the kingdom of God (John 3:3, 5). As we have no control over our own birth, it is God who brings about this transformation for us. Ephesians 2:4-5 further confirms this, "But because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, made us alive with Christ even when we were dead in transgressions — it is by grace you are saved.

Love for Others

Reflecting God's Love: God's love for humanity is demonstrated in His desire that none should perish (<u>2 Peter 3:9</u>). Sharing the Gospel is an act of love, seeking the best for others, which is their reconciliation with God.



Spread the Good News of Jesus Christ



For there is one God and one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus, who gave himself as a ransom for all men ... (2 Timothy 2:5-6).

A Core Message of Love, Redemption, and Grace

The Gospel of Jesus Christ is a message of profound love, redemption, and grace. At its heart, it tells us that God so loved the world that He gave His only Son, Jesus Christ, so that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life (John 3:16). This act of love demonstrates God's desire to restore the broken relationship between humanity and Himself, a relationship fractured by sin.

The Problem of Man's Separation from God

The message starts by acknowledging God's perfect holiness (<u>Isaiah 6:1-4</u>) and man's inherently unholy nature (<u>Romans 3:9-18</u>, 23). The problem for humans is that no one could endure the fair punishment for their sin. Therefore, in order for justice to be served for sin while also providing a free pardon for those who are redeemed, a sinless substitute would be

necessary, who would be willing to endure the deserved punishment (Isaiah 53). This requires God to be gracious enough to accept a substitute in place of the sinner. Additionally, God would need to provide a mediator who could represent both God and humans and still withstand the full punishment required by God. The apostle Paul writes In 1 Timothy 2:5, "For there is one God and one mediator between God and mankind, the man Christ Jesus."

The Solution that God Provides to Reconcile Men to Himself

... have the same mindset as Christ Jesus:

Who, being in very nature God,
did not consider equality with God something
to be used to his own advantage;
rather, he made himself nothing
by taking the very nature of a servant,
being made in human likeness.
And being found in appearance as a man,
he humbled himself
by becoming obedient to death—
even death on a cross!

Therefore God exalted him to the highest place and gave him the name that is above every name,

that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow,

in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue acknowledge that Jesus Christ is Lord,

to the glory of God the Father.

Philippians 2:5-11

Redemption comes through Jesus Christ's sacrifice on the cross, where He paid the penalty for our sins. Through His death and resurrection, Jesus conquered sin and death, offering us complete forgiveness of sin, the gift of salvation and the promise of eternal life with Him. This mercy and grace are freely offered to all; it cannot be earned through deeds but is received by the gift of faith (Ephesians 2:8-9). "It does not, therefore, depend on man's desire or effort, but on God's mercy (Romans 9:16).

Grace is the unmerited favor of God towards us. It is by grace that we are saved, through faith. This means that our

salvation is not something we can achieve on our own but is a gift from God, stemming from His love for us, despite our imperfections and failures.

Responses to Common Questions

Q: How can a loving God allow suffering?

A: Suffering in the world is a result of sin and the brokenness it brings.
