Faithfulness: Abraham's Ultimate Test

Love Embodied: The Parable of the Good Samaritan



> **In the Christian faith, love is not just a feeling or emotion; it is an action, a commitment, and a way of living that reflects the heart of God. Among the many stories in the Bible that illustrate love, the Parable of the Good Samaritan, as told by Jesus in [Luke 10:25-37](#), stands out for its powerful message about what it means to truly love one's neighbor.**

The Story Unfolds

The parable begins with a lawyer testing Jesus, asking what he must do to inherit eternal life. Jesus responds with a question, leading the lawyer to answer with the commandment to love God with all one's heart, soul, strength, and mind, and to love one's neighbor as oneself.

The Samaritan's actions embody the essence of love as taught by Jesus. He saw beyond societal prejudices and divisions, recognizing the inherent value and dignity of the wounded man. His love was practical, sacrificial, and without expectation of reward. This is the kind of love that Jesus calls His followers to exhibit—a love that transcends boundaries, sees the need, and responds with compassion and generosity.

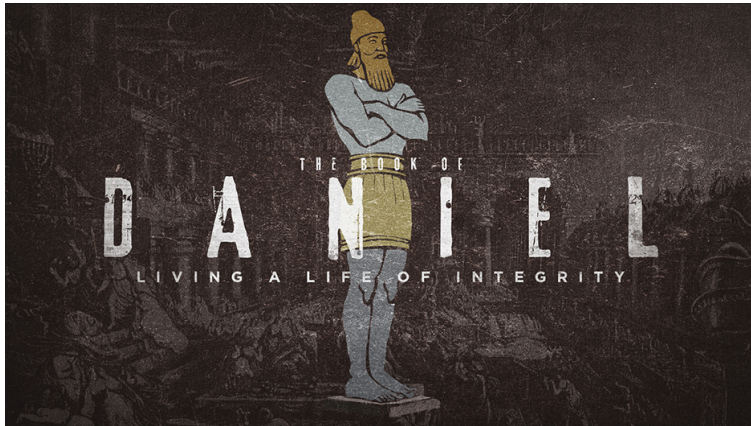
